01. SPECTACULAR WILDLIFE

Situated in Mara Naboisho Conservancy, with fifty thousand acres of wilderness to explore, Saruni Leopard Hill is ideal for game-viewing, birdwatching, stargazing. Immerse yourself in Nature and enjoy a truly unique and life-enriching safari experience. Mara Naboisho has abundant wildlife by day and by night, and is particularly well known for its exceptional sightings of lions. The waterholes directly in front of the camp offer you the chance to sit back and watch animals from the comfort of your tent.

02. PERFECT SUNRISES

Enjoy a cup of Kenyan coffee on your private deck as the African sun climbs above the horizon, flooding the savannah with light and signalling the start of a new day on safari. Don't miss the iconic silhouette of the lightning-scarred Double Fig tree, which has grown here for decades.

03. MARA STARGAZING

At the press of a button, the roof of your safari tent opens to reveal the vast African night sky, filled with stars. Drifting off to sleep listening to lions roaring, hyenas whooping, and the chorus of night sounds is one of the quintessential Mara experiences.

04. EXHILARATING MOMENTS

Enjoy incredible wildlife encounters on both day and night games drives, with only a limited number of vehicles allowed in the conservancy. To get even closer to Nature, nothing beats exploring this incredible landscape on foot. It is a chance to see the smaller things that might be missed on a drive, while cultural experiences give you unique insights into sustainable savannah lifestyles.

05. POSITIVE IMPACTS

We provide year-round support to over 500 Maasai families in the area through land-lease fees, employment opportunities and sustainability projects that are improving the quality of life for many Mara Naboisho community members.

06. PRESERVING A KEY ECOSYSTEM

Tourism directly supports conservation through daily 'park' fees – this revenue is the main source of commercial income for the community, used not only to run the conservancy but to provide members with support in areas like health and education. It also provides them with a powerful financial incentive to keep community land undeveloped and in its natural state dedicated exclusively to tourism activity, ensuring the wildlife can traverse freely and safely throughout.
