



JANUARY

Short rain showers are possible, and daytime temperatures can be a little warm, but game viewing is excellent - many of the resident plains game will be calving at this time of year so perfect for watching those new-borns on wobbly legs take their first steps. All camps open.

FEBRUARY

The days are warm, and the rain showers increase towards month end. Calving season continues, attracting opportunistic predators. Naboisho Conservancy has a large population of lion and the young plains game offer ideal hunting opportunities. All camps open.





MARCH

Great game viewing continues but the main rainy season brings a mix of intermittent showers and occasional heavy storms creating dramatic skies sought after by photographers. Ideal for those looking for reduced visitor numbers and low season rates. All camps open.





APRIL

The peak of the rainy season is here with most days having some rain. Don't let this put you off - the rains bring in the migrant birds and with trees and flowers in bloom the savannah looks simply stunning. Rekero is closed.

AUGUST





MAY

The frequency of rain lessens toward the end of the month leaving more sunshine and pleasantly warm days. The absence of crowds lends itself to exclusive wildlife sightings and the lush green savannah, clear of haze and dust, makes for wonderful photographs. Rekero and Encounter Mara closed.

SEPTEMBER



The migration viewing continues and those

looking to catch a river crossing may find

themselves stalked out on the banks of the

Mara or Talek River. Rekero and Emboo are

ideal for those who would like a front row

seat. Visitor numbers remain extremely



JUNE

Weather conditions are improving and game viewing in both the main reserve and the surrounding conservancies is particularly rewarding as visitor numbers tend to be low, especially in comparison to the coming months. All camps open.





JULY

Dry season has arrived, together with the first herds of the migrating wildebeest. Crossings of the Mara and Talek Rivers begin, and visitor numbers steadily increase. Being prepared for the crowds and high traffic that comes with the migration is crucial. All camps open.



OCTOBER

October brings a little more dust but a few less vehicles. The migration herds start to make their way south, back towards the Serengeti, leaving short grasses, and excellent game viewing in the Mara. All camps open.







NOVEMBER

Showers start to creep back in as the dry season comes to an end. Temperatures rises, so walks are best done in the early mornings. The last of the main migration herds make their way south while the Loita herds move North through the Naboisho Conservancy. All camps open.



DECEMBER

You'll still find the Loita herds in Naboisho Conservancy, but the main migration herds have gone, leaving the resident game in the spotlight during the peak festive season. Before the tall grasses return, game drives focus on the variety of animals found here year-round. All camps open.
