Growing together

Expanding the corridor, one community at a time

After 17 years, the Kwakuchinja Wildlife Corridor is growing. In 2025, the Tanzanian government began the formal gazettal process to expand the protected area from **280 km²** to **600 km²** – **more than doubling its size** and securing its future permanently.

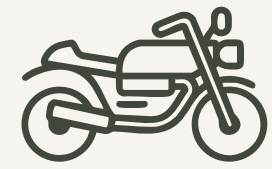
> Tanzania's first conservation command centre

The **JMPC is now fully operational** – bringing CCA's team, government agencies, researchers, and partners together in real time to coordinate anti-poaching, monitor conflict hotspots, and share live data nationwide.

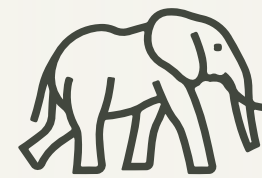

CCA's 10 villages within the Burunge WMA are partners in conservation – not bystanders. In 2025, 2,832 entrepreneurs were trained, 2,077 new businesses launched, and 3,066 jobs created. 180 young people joined the Future Entrepreneur Programme; 40 went on safari – many for the very first time.

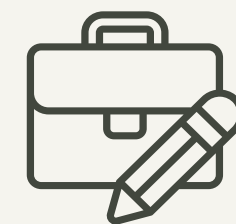
