



Okonjima Plains Camp is situated within the Okonjima Nature Reserve – home of the AfriCat Foundation.

Okonjima Plains Camp consists of:

- 10 large View Rooms and 14 spacious Classic Rooms
- The Plains Camp Barn, that encompasses the reception area, curio shop, a restaurant and dining area. The veranda looks out onto the waterhole.
- A swimming pool.
- A Wi-Fi hotspot and cell phone reception as well as undercover, private parking.

Each View Room offers:

- A large veranda with two daybeds and two loungers
- Two double beds
- Cell phone reception, a working desk and comfortable reading chair
- An en-suite bathroom
- A tea/coffee station, a mini fridge for own use
- Two roof fans, Aircon
- A security safe
- Private, undercover parking

Each Classic Room offers:

- A small veranda with two chairs
- Two double beds
- Cell phone reception, a working desk and two chairs
- An en-suite bathroom
- A tea/coffee station, a mini fridge for own use
- Two roof fans, Aircon
- A security safe
- Private, undercover parking

Child Policy:

Okonjima Plains Camp welcomes families with children aged 3 years and older. We offer a child-friendly environment; however, due to the nature of our activities, certain activities have age restrictions.

- Age 3 and above: Children can participate in the Game & Nature Drives.
- Age 6 and above: Children can participate in all park activities, except for Pangolin Tracking, Rhino Tracking on foot, Into AfriCat – Behind the Science and Guided Walking Trails.
- Age 8 and above: Children can participate in park activities, except for Pangolin Tracking, Rhino Tracking on foot and AfriCat – Behind the Science.
- Age 12 and above: Children can participate in all available activities.

Children must be supervised by their parents in and around the lodge and surrounding areas. They are not permitted to swim unaccompanied. Regrettably, no child-minding services are available. Parents are always responsible for their children's safety.

Okonjima Nature Reserve:

Nestled at the base of the Omboroko Mountains, the family-operated Okonjima Lodge is surrounded by acacia thornveld, in an area free from Malaria.

Located between Windhoek, Namibia's capital, and the Etosha National Park, the lodge offers convenient access. It's reachable with a mere two-and-a-half-hour drive or a swift one-hour flight from Windhoek to the private airstrip within the expansive 22,000-hectare (55,000-acre or 220 km²) nature reserve. Famed for the regular sightings of leopard, brown hyaena and pangolin during safaris, the Okonjima Nature Reserve is also the dwelling place of The AfriCat Foundation – founded in 1991 and officially registered as a private, not-for-profit, non-governmental organization (N.G.O.) in 1992.

AfriCat stands out for conducting one of Namibia's longest-running Leopard Monitoring Projects. Additionally, the AfriCat Pangolin Research Project is among the few initiatives worldwide dedicated to studying free-roaming pangolins. Committed to substantial conservation endeavours, AfriCat's dedication to safeguarding wildlife in their native habitat is profound. This commitment extends across the expansive 200km² Okonjima Nature Reserve.

The partnership between the Okonjima Lodges, the Okonjima Nature Reserve and the AfriCat Foundation is a demonstration of the symbiosis between conservation and tourism. Research by the AfriCat Foundation has confirmed that the Okonjima Nature Reserve is an ideal ecosystem for leopard, brown hyaena and pangolin. The Reserve is thus one of the best places in the country to see these normally shy and elusive animals.
